

NOTIFICATION

First meeting of the Ad Hoc Technical Expert Group Meeting on dry and sub-humid lands

Montreal, Canada, 18 - 22 March 2002

At its fifth meeting, the Conference of the Parties (COP) to the Convention on Biological Diversity endorsed the programme of work on dry and sub-humid lands biodiversity, as contained in annex I of Decision V/23. To assist with the implementation of the programme of work, COP requested the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice (SBSTTA) to establish an ad hoc technical group on this topic. The tasks to be undertaken by this group are:

- Consolidate and assess information on the status and trends of biodiversity of dry and sub-humid lands, on the possible establishment of an international network of dry and sub-humid areas of particular value for biodiversity, on indicators, on processes affecting biodiversity, on global benefits derived from biodiversity, and on the socio-economic impacts of its loss, including the interrelationship between biodiversity and poverty;
- Assess the progress and the effects of the specific measures that have been taken for the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity, for resource management and for the support of sustainable livelihoods;
- Assess international priorities set up at the regional and global levels and make proposals for expected outcomes, further activities, possible actors that may implement them, and timetables for action.

The first meeting of the ad hoc technical expert group on dry and sub-humid lands will be held from 18 to 22 March 2002 in the premises of the Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity in Montreal, Canada.

Further to the notification dated 18 January 2002 inviting Parties to the Convention to nominate experts in the field of dry and sub-humid lands biological diversity, I am pleased to convey herewith the composition of the group of selected experts (Annex I). The selection of experts was based on nominations by the Parties and organizations, taking into account the participants' demonstrated expertise and experience in the field of conservation and sustainable use of biological diversity in dryland, Mediterranean, arid, semi-arid, grassland and savannah

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ecosystems, geographical distribution and gender balance. A number of experts were selected jointly with the Secretariat of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD).
